



Allen H. Zikmund

March 26, 1922 - January 29, 2018

Allen “Al” H. Zikmund, 95 of Kearney died Monday, January 29, 2018 at CHI Health - Good Samaritan Hospital in Kearney.

Funeral services will be Friday, February 2, 2018 at 10:30 a.m. at First United Methodist Church in Kearney. Rev. Alan Davis will officiate. Private burial will be prior to services at Kearney Cemetery. Visitation is planned Thursday from 5:00 – 7:00 p.m. at Horner Lieske McBride & Kuhl Funeral and Cremation Service in Kearney. Allen Herman Zikmund was born March 26, 1922, on a homestead farm near Ord, Nebraska, the only child of Henry and Ethel (Stowell) Zikmund. A 1939 graduate of Ord High School, Al was a vocal and instrumental musician, a member of the undefeated football team, and a track participant and broad jump state champion.

Zikmund attended the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, earning an education degree. He played halfback for the Cornhuskers, scoring a touchdown in the 1941 Rose Bowl, and was a track competitor. At UNL he was a member of Innocents Society and Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity.

Upon graduation in 1943, Zikmund served as a naval lieutenant, commanding regiments of officer candidates at Columbia University, where he spent most of his naval career. After military service and considering a professional football career, Al returned to the University of Nebraska and obtained a master’s degree.

He was united in marriage to Verlene Witham of Agra, Kansas, in a 1943 ceremony at Riverside Church in New York City. They raised their children, Sue, Jim, and Sally, while Al

taught and coached at Alliance and Grand Island, NE high schools. In 1955 the family moved to Kearney, NE, where "Zik" served as Kearney State College football coach and assisted the track coach and athletic director. He was an associate professor of physical education and served as athletic director for 17 years, retiring in 1987.

Al and Verlene enjoyed traveling throughout the country during their retirement. He loved to fish and hunt and was an active gardener. Among his interests were home repair and building at their home and their cabin at Harlan County Reservoir. In Kearney he served many years with the American Red Cross and held memberships in Kiwanis Golden K, Elks Lodge 984, American Legion, Athletics Associates, Loper Athletic Club, and Emeriti Faculty. He was a lifetime member of the United Methodist Church.

Preceded in death by his beloved wife, Verlene, Al leaves his children Sue and Paul Pocock of Castle Pines, CO; Jim and Vicki Zikmund of Kearney, NE; and Sally and Steve Husen of Grand Island, NE. He is survived by eight grandchildren and spouses: Chris and Kelly Pocock of Kearney, NE; Carrie Neddenriep of Parker, CO; Tom and Sara Zikmund of Alma, NE; Steve and Ashley Zikmund of Funk, NE; Jack and Nickie Melson of Pacific Junction, IA; Kate and Dan Horton of Manhattan, IL; Jeremy and Andrea Husen of Gretna, NE; and Tim and Emily Husen of Suwanee, GA. His great grandchildren include Peyton Pocock, Shelby Pocock, Mason Bennett, Dylan Neddenriep, Barrett Zikmund, Cole Zikmund, Shane Zikmund, Claire Horton, Jay Horton, Emerson Husen, Hudson Husen, and Harper Husen. One sister-in-law, Bonnie Johnson of Kenesaw, NE, also survives. Al leaves a host of family, friends, and former players.
